

Hinton Recipes - Quick and Easy Lemon Cheesecake

(Serves 8)

For the base:

- 10 digestive biscuits
- 50g (1oz) butter
- 25g (1oz) demerara sugar
- For the cheesecake:
- 150ml (1/4pt) single cream
- 397g (14oz) can full-fat condensed milk
- 175g (6oz) low-fat soft cheese
- grated rind & juice of 3 large lemons
- For the topping:
- 150ml (1/4pt) double cream, whipped
- fresh strawberries to decorate



Put biscuits in plastic bag & crush with a rolling pin.

Melt butter in saucepan, remove from heat & stir in biscuit crumbs & sugar.

Press mixture evenly over the base & sides of a 23cm (9") flan dish or tin & leave to set in fridge.

Mix together the single cream, condensed milk, soft cheese & lemon rind. Add juice a little at a time & whisk until the mixture thickens.

Pour the mixture into flan case & leave to chill in fridge for 4 hours or overnight.

Decorate with swirls of whipped cream and fresh strawberries. Eat and enjoy.

The month of May felt more like high summer than late spring. Creamy white hawthorn blossoms soon turned brown and were replaced by abundant scent filled elderflowers. Fragrant honeysuckle filled the air and we picked water mint at Cutt Mill. By the river, brilliant blue and green damsel flies emerged and the hedgerows were covered in strange cocoons of Ermine moth.

Some people flocked to the coast after lockdown was eased a little, desperate to see the sea, sit on a beach and enjoy a day out. Others decided to stay local and sit by the River Stour with picnics. Children paddled in the cool water near Sturminster Newton mill and young people gathered in groups at Cutt Mill, sunbathing and swimming. Unfortunately this popular activity meant too many turned up - social distancing was forgotten. The lane to the mill had to have restricted access signs and a barrier erected. The river wildlife returned - maybe a Kingfisher ? To have a garden to relax in was a wonderful thing especially in the evenings when the warm air lingered on and the sun setting over the Blackmore Vale created a vast orange glow in the sky.

Walking in the first summer rain in early June was a very special moment. The earth opened up to drink it in and then the wildflowers and grasses in the hedgerows simply grew and grew. Not so good for hayfever sufferers but the lanes overflowed with wildness. Tall purple thistles, blue, mauve, pink and white comfrey, mallow, buttercups, wild carrot, hog weed with huge heads of white flowers. A feast for bees, insects and butterflies. Some verges were cut and the flower banks disappeared but happily came back after more rain.

Nature gives us so much and pausing to enjoy it must surely be at the top of our list of things to do. Less driving, less shopping, more walking/cycling and of course picnics will help us to stay local and discover what we have on our village doorstep. Who knows we may see Kingfishers.
