1. Community Apple Day (Liz Collins)



It is hard to believe that when Shane Johnstone and I were discussing the idea of a community apple pressing day at last year's Harvest lunch, Covid-19 was unheard off. Then in March we thought it would be good to have something to look forward to in the Autumn after lockdown, but hadn't bargained on a second wave and new restrictions. Plans for a social gathering to complement the working session had to be cancelled, but in the end we were able to go ahead with the juicing operation and we think we produced in excess of 200 litres of juice, using donated apples and those picked from the Community Orchard. Because of social distancing considerations we needed to work with a limited number of helpers which made for a very full day, but it was a very useful learning curve and will stand us in good stead if there is sufficient demand for a full event next year.

Many thanks to all who helped with donating and picking apples and providing empty bottles, and especially to those who helped on the day, with especial mention

to Chris Townsend for his practical help and expertise, Alice Fox-Pitt for supplying additional equipment and removing the pomace (left-over pulp) to feed her pigs (and her girls for their help in the afternoon), John and Gwyn James for setting up a cider-making display, Kevin Peto-Bostick for a mammoth session on the juicer and Kate Townsend for help with the filling of bottles and pasteurising - also to Alice and Ed Townsend for their help as runners between sites.

At the time of writing we are still working on the distribution of the spoils, but hopefully everyone will get a chance to taste the juice and maybe later in the year, some cider! As it wasn't possible for us to open up the site to spectators, we have a number of photos recording the day which we hope to have displayed on the Village website.

3 Way Village Meeting (Janet Bolton)

Ride and Stride Saturday Sept 12 (David Dunning)

Just to say that I duly completed the sponsored 44m cycle trip. It was sunny, not more than a breath of wind and dry, best weather for cycling. I journeyed an hour to Yeovil Pen Mill visiting 5 churches before catching the train to Dorchester. Two in the parish where I live then on to Oborne, where there is the ancient chancel of the 14th century church on the A30 with a Victorian gem of a building actually in the village itself. Oborne was no doubt a `plague` village where the villagers succumbed to the 14th century Black Death, a sobering thought in these times. Then a brief stop at Castleton and on to Sherborne Abbey .



Their vicar has recently retired and is about to appear in the Blackmore Vale, but this at least was going on as normal, indeed there is an interim Chaplain to the Abbey, himself retired. A bottle of water gratefully received, many pleasantries; then I needed to get back on the road for a steady cycle to Yeovil. I made the train comfortably. It had 4 carriages: gone are the days a locomotive thundered along this single track packed to the doors of 5 or more units with Birmingham holiday makers out for the sea sun and beaches of Weymouth. Usually the train is a couple of old 1950s units trundling uncomfortably along, but today it featured brand new

units. However, someone had not done their homework as it was impossible to get the bike under the luggage racks suspended above the cycle bay running half the length of the carriage. The guard grinned as I gave up and we just shrugged. No other bikes or passengers here, so no problem, but I made a mental note to discern what unit I would be travelling in future. When you step off the rural world into the small county town, all the hustle and bustle overwhelm the pleasantry of the cycle day in Dorchester. Brief stops at three churches all different denominations, but I discovered that the Anglicans at least are in good heart, over 80 regulars before the lockdown and new appointments for all the Dorchester Anglican churches are due. Now my intention was to return home cycling mainly back up the Frome Valley (via Maiden Newton and other villages), there being no trains back on a Saturday till later in the day.

Following the old Roman road below Poundbury I reached the top of the down where a fine Roman fort had once stood commanding the valley. An aqueduct provided water for the town which also boasted in the 3rd century a mosaic manufacturer – you can see the work done in a still standing town house near the Dorchester Court House: probable that this source was also the designer and producer of the Hinton Mosaic around AD350, the finest mosaic found in western Europe outside Italy and a national treasure kept in the British Museum. The route runs straight but up and down the crazily steep road to Bradford Peverill, a wealthy village whose church bore no signs of R&S, closed but evidently in good repair. First stop for a sandwich lunch, beautifully quiet and refined, surrounded by a glorious crowd of wild cyclamen. Almost no one about anywhere, so on to Stratton, again closed and no R&S this year, but I'm not surprised in the pandemic situation. Tempted but not overcome by the good-looking pub next door, where a small gathering of cyclists wearing the familiar yellow sur-coat of R&S were tucking into a repast, socially distanced. The cycle route takes over now on the other side of the valley from the main noisy A37 to Yeovil, and along silent leafy lanes, a national sustrans cycle route (26) absolutely without any sort of traffic. Occasional farm roads and unmade tracks through woods for about 5 miles through Frampton and finally to Maiden Newton.



Now in years previously there's always something on there: bring and buy with cream teas to encourage local folk (and R&S) to spend, socialise and enjoy their fine church which some enterprising clergy have modernised tastefully without losing the sense of time –honoured worship on an ancient site. So, today....yes! A lovely friendly couple (distinct northern drawl –turned out they were from parts of Yorkshire I knew quite well) made tea and home-made scones with jam, meanwhile the organist turned up to play some old favourites as we chatted in the wonderfully late afternoon sunshine. And even a modern, properly equipped lavatory, rare in the rural church!

But riders can't dally! A long climb up to Cattistock, a most impressive tower-strengthened church structure imposing in the village, visitor forms and sanitising with messages of welcome, so on over the hills between the Frome and the Wriggle valleys, crossing the A37 where tractor-led streams of vehicles almost blocked the road in both directions; and down into the comfortable, well-laid-out village of Chetnole. And the rare experience of meeting a parishioner looking after things, so a chance to catch-up as I have taken some services here.

But now the final long mainly downward route via Leigh and Longburton to Sherborne across the Wriggle valley. Admittedly I was now losing the complete sense of enjoyment as 40m clocked up, and still 4 to go as I steadily dragged my route above the town with the dominating Abbey plain and important, central to the view. In fact I stopped here again for a 2nd sandwich and swig of water to regain some strength for the last 20minutes mainly uphill to Milborne Port by way of the backroads avoiding the awful A30. did rather more miles than I intended but slowly! I visited 10 more churches on this way back
